How times have changed since I joined Rotary in 1982.

It was then a male membership club and members' wives were known as Rotary-Annes. Attendance at weekly meetings



was obligatory although it was possible to maintain your club attendance by attending a 'make-up' at another club within a defined period of time either before or after your 'missed weekly meeting'. Visiting members returned to their home clubs with a duly endorsed 'make-up' ticket and the back page of the District Governor's monthly Newsletter always recorded the attendance statistic for each club within the district.

Progressively we have seen things change to such a degree to accommodate current lifestyles and the old standards looked at in retrospect seem to be almost unbelievably archaic and restrictive.

What has not changed, however, is the value of membership of your Rotary Club if you wish to commit to community and wider service.

In his autobiography, My Road to Rotary, which was published in 1948, Paul Harris who founded Rotary in 1905 said: "There can be no better introduction to the life of a community than one that comes through the local Rotary club."

My own experience has certainly confirmed that view.

We now start Chapter 2 of the journey.

Same people, same motivation but more of us.

As a member of the Rotary Club of Modbury since January, 1986 I am no doubt counted as part of "the old guard",

who has unfortunately witnessed the gradual decline of membership over the years. However, throughout this time the primary aim of our Club has been to serve the community in which we live and our Club has accomplished this "in spades"!!. It should be noted that this phenomenon is not solely related to our Club, but to a great number of likeminded community service orientated organisations.

My fondest reminiscences are of the lasting friendships forged over the past 30 plus years and assisting the community (in a small way) in which we live. There have been many significant highlights throughout the years and no doubt these will be amply described by our Club historian and fellow "oldie", Keith Rendell. I have therefore taken "the easy way out" and have promoted a number of projects that illustrate the creed of our Club - "Service above Self"!!

A number of community service projects (local and overseas) that I believe have significantly highlighted not only our Club but Rotary International handsomely -

The John Tilley Memorial Student award was initiated by our Club to promote an outstanding student chosen by the faculty of the Modbury High School (for his/her) academic record and community service work. The monetary award has increased somewhat over the years to now be worth \$1250- (to assist the awardee in their tertiary pursuits. The calibre of the students who have won this prestigious award, speaks volumes of the relative student and promotes a tangible link between our Club and the Modbury High School, which is one of the largest in the region.

Another innovative community service project related to primary school students within the City of Tea Tree Gully. The students who participated were invited to prepare a booklet pertaining to the historical significance of the region, eg an old stone bridge, an old hotel or house. The winning school then had their presentation duly published.

Another community service project which was initiated in November, 1995 was the establishment of the Steventon Probus Club which has proved to be a winner within the City of Tea Tree Gully.t

Several overseas projects spring to mind, in particular:

- Raising funds for a village community at Katabi-Busambaga (Rotary Club of Entebbe) to purchase a brick making machine in order to build a school.
- Joining forces with an Indian Rotary Club to enable the club to have a number of wells bored (for fresh water) thus alleviating the need of the women folk of the village, to walk long distances to obtain their daily supply of water.

Such projects in my opinion promote understanding and goodwill amongst nations and highlight the exceedingly good work carried forth by Rotary International.

Whilst there are no doubt many, many highlights that this Club can be proud of, it is the members who have made the Club!!

I close with the following quotation from 19th century French dramatist Honoré de Balzac:

"We do not attach ourselves lastingly to anything that has not cost us care, labour or longing"!!

Isaac Reports from Finland

I am now with my second host family which I will be with for around three weeks. I will then move to another family for the



rest of the summer break around the second week of July. In August I will go to my last family in August for 4-5 months. I am doing very well.

Euro tour was magical and I had so many amazing experiences and have heaps of memories. Now my oldies are beginning to leave and saying goodbye to them has been hard. I've know them for only five months but some of them have become the best friends I have ever had. In August my newbies will arrive and the cycle will begin again. There were some gifts given out from oldies that newbies that have been passed down over the years. I received the "Mexican Australian bro potion" which represents the friendship between Australians and Mexicans on exchange. I also got the equivalent from the Italians too.

I hope you and everyone at the club is doing well.

This is only a short piece and is different to anything that I have written this year however it is an important part of exchange and I thought I would share it anyway. A piece on Euro tour will be coming in the next few days.

To give some context for the following:

There are two groups that will be on exchange in a country every year. Those who arrive in august and will stay through to June/July and those who like me will arrive in January and leave in January the next year (this is just so the exchange year lies up with the school year of your home country). So, this means that we are now at the time of the year where my oldies are finishing their exchange and leaving Finland.

"The hardest part of exchange is not saying goodbye, it's not knowing when you're going to say hello again"

Yesterday I experienced one of the hardest days of my exchange so far. I had to say goodbye to my oldies, goodbye to the most beautiful group of people I know, goodbye to more than just friends, goodbye to family.

Although I have 6 months of exchange left and a whole new group of exchange students to meet I am going to take the opportunity to reflect and share what I think exchange relationships are and what they mean.

When you leave your home country you say goodbye to your friends and family knowing that you will see them again in twelve months time. You have the reassurance that you can count down the days until you see them. When you say good bye to an exchange student, whether they are leaving or you are you don't have that reassurance. It means that after that goodbye the next hello could be in months, years or maybe in some cases never. That makes the goodbye impossibly hard. When you spend five months with someone who teaches you the ropes of exchange, gives you someone to talk to when times are hard and someone to laugh with when you need it most it is incredibly hard to even think about saying goodbye. What makes it even more difficult is you don't know when our going to see them again. By just having a conversation with someone who really knows what you are going through it can turn a week around. I know multiple people like this who have really helped me get through my first few months of exchange. It's not just the lows and the difficult times that they are there. It's at the highest points on your exchange.

For me the past two weeks of Euro tour have been the highlight of my exchange but it would not have been the same without these people. We could have been anywhere in the world and I think I would have still had the time of my life. Even in that short two weeks I left with twice as many friends than I had at the start. Exchange students help create memories that will last a life time and their presence makes every moment enjoyable. They have been there at some of the best moments of my exchange and are the people that I will never forget.

When I look back on my first half of exchange these are the people who immediately come to mind and whose company I will cherish forever.

I guess what I am trying to say is that when you're on exchange you grow close to people very quickly and then they are gone in the blink of an eye, and what hurts the most, you don't know when you're going to get them back.

The Rotary Club of Modbury met for the final time on Monday 25 June 2018.




A Bus Arrives and a Bus Departs


