It has been a busy time since our last meeting with working bees conducted out in the park and in the Friends shed, a Planting Day and workshops. All the more important to record our volunteer hours! Thank you to everyone who has participated in any way.

Although it has been quite chilly early in the mornings, our dedicated volunteers led by Graham Fisher have soldiered on each Wednesday morning. They continue to build on the great work of eradicating mainly olives in the park. It is great to see native plants growing where they had previously struggled to survive with introduced plant species taking over.

Graham is unwell and unable to participate in our working bees for the moment. We wish him well and appreciate his dedication to nature conservation and pest plant eradication in AHRP. Reinforcement of the shed is now complete with our resident possum probably very happy to have some quieter sleeping time!

#### Sign on FOAH trailer

We now have a professionally created sign by Sally Caston of Houghton on our trailer to promote FOAH while our volunteers are working out in the park. Thanks to Graham Fisher for making the frame for the sign. Our logo has been recreated by Sally to give us a much-improved version.



#### **Parks Passes**

A unique code number has been sent to members who volunteer with FOAH. The code is valid until 30th June 2019. If you volunteer in the park you are eligible for a South Australian parks pass.

#### **Guest Speaker – 6th June 2018**

Our guest speaker at the June meeting was Ray Hickman, Secretary and Convenor of Friends of Vulkathunha-Gammon Ranges National Park. Ray and a group of dedicated volunteers work in the park during April to September.

Here is a brief outline of his presentation.

#### History of the Friends Group

#### **Environmental monitoring**

This is a citizen-science project based on Weetootla Spring, which is located in the Park, and Nepouie Spring, located on Wooltana.

### Components of the monitoring

- water quality measurements –
  pH, salinity, temperature,
  turbidity, dissolved oxygen.
- 2. observations on fish numbers and sizes
- 3. water bug (macroinvertebrate) observations,
- 4. weed recognition and removal,
- assessment of goat impact on vegetation,
- yellow-footed rock wallaby numbers/habitat.

Note: not all these aspects are covered on every visit

#### Oocaboolina outstation – located 6 km East of Nepabunna

Currently the building is secure against weather but is not usable.

The aim is to restore the building to a condition where it is suitable for use by the public and/or park authorities.

#### Work completed so far

- 1. Installation of a water tank
- Clearing of roof gutters and installation of gutter guard
- Surrounding fence to exclude kangaroos and goats
- 4. Removal of Athel Pine

#### Possibilities for future projects

- refurbish plant irrigation system at park headquarters and protect plants from herbivores
- marking out of camp sites at Weetootla campground
- sanding and oiling of seats and benches
- establishment of a long-distance walking trail
- involvement of students at Leigh Creek Area School in group activities.

I have met with the director of the kindy who, along with her staff, are keen for the children to plant seedlings in AHRP. They have regular 'Bush Kindy' days in the park so that the children can have a connection with nature. FOAH member Mary Lane kindly supplied 20 plants and another 40 were bought by the Department for Environment and Water (DEW) for the children to plant. On 26th July, 'Ranger Nick' assisted the group with each child having two pots including sheoak, SA Blue Gum, hakea carinata, acacias and Silver Leaf Banksia. You can see 'their plants' in the area of the Little Quarry Loop.

#### Sedge Snippet - Selected Items

Published monthly, Sedge Snippet helps volunteers keep up to date with volunteer achievements, case studies, upcoming events, grants and training opportunities. Here are a few important and interesting articles from the latest editions of the Volunteer Support Newsletter:

#### July 2018 Edition

#### **Volunteer hours**

At the end of every financial year the figures for volunteer hours in all-natural resources management projects supported by the Department for Environment and Water (DEW) are collected. This is a great way to display all the hard work groups have put in throughout the year, with work valued at \$40 per hour.

#### Changes to natural resources management

A brief update about the Marshall Liberal Government changes to natural resources management in the Adelaide and Mount Lofty Ranges region:

There will be significant reform of natural resources management in South Australia
including the repeal of the Natural Resources Management Act 2004 (NRM Act) and
replacing it with a new Landscapes South Australia Act. The introduction of the new
Landscapes SA Act represents a significant opportunity to reset and reform natural
resource management in South Australia, holding onto what is working well and
making improvements where necessary.

- The Adelaide and Mount Lofty Ranges NRM Board will continue as usual until June 2019. From July 2019 the regional areas that it serves will be covered by two new boards established to serve the Hills and Fleurieu region and the Plains and Valleys region north of Adelaide. Each Landscape Board will have seven members, three of which will be directly elected by the community.
- The Landscape Boards will be at arm's length from government, responsible for their own budgets and the employment of a general manager who will be responsible for employing and directing staff.

#### Volunteer discovers alert weed

The great value of volunteers to the environment has been shown again with South Australian Seed Conservation Centre and State Herbarium volunteer, Ron Taylor, recently identifying the weed <u>Salvinia</u> while visiting a property in Basket Range in the Adelaide Hills.

Salvinia is a free-floating perennial weed from Brazil and has become one of the world's worst aquatic weeds. It is a Weed of National Significance and is also listed as a state alert weed, meaning it is a declared plant that is not yet established in South Australia but poses a serious threat. If you think you have seen this weed, please contact our ranger.

#### August 2018 Edition

#### Schools and volunteer groups working together

Schools and community groups are joining forces to help protect and expand natural places in the Adelaide and Mount Lofty Ranges. Through volunteering, students have the opportunity to gain skills in conservation and bush care, spend time with community role models and make a difference through hands-on learning. It also benefits their well-being.

There are a range of activities that students can take part in, including weeding, mulching, water and monitoring, and on park volunteering can be linked to learning areas such as Science, HASS, Geography, Maths, English, and Health and Physical Education.

#### Get park maps on your mobile

turn again!

Did you know you can download the free <u>Avenza PDF Map</u> app on your smartphone or tablet and. have interactive national park maps on hand when you need them?

The app uses your device's built-in GPS to plot your real-time location within the park onto a map. The app can be used without a network connection and without roaming charges. You can also measure area and distance, plot photos and drop placemark pins.

#### How to get it working on your device:

Download the Avenza PDF maps app from the app store whilst you are still in range. Open up the app and click the shopping cart icon.

Click 'Find' and type the name of the national park or reserve you are looking for.

Click on the map you are after and install it (all of the National Parks South Australia's maps are free).

You will now find a list of your installed maps on the home page of the Avenza app. Use our maps through the Avenza PDF map app while in the park and never take a wrong

#### Friends of Parks Inc. Board – Business Plan Review Workshop

On 10th July I attended a workshop for Friends group Presidents at Belair National Park. The objective was to identify priority focus areas for the board's future strategic business plan. Ian Radbone, Team Leader, Community and Volunteer Support Programs Unit, DEW, who had put the business plan together, facilitated the workshop.


John Schutz, DEW Acting Chief Executive spoke of the importance of Friends groups and highlighted the importance of Friends groups being part of the fabric of parks and stressed that the business plan needs to suit all Friends groups. John mentioned that 20 additional rangers will be employed by DEW as they are critical to front line management.

The Landscapes of South Australia Act will replace the NRM Act, with a simpler approach at the coal face. There will be significant legislative reform, for example, in respecting biodiversity and valuing nature. Friends of Parks will have a much stronger role to play in the process. The new legislation is planned to be adopted in March 2019.

The small group discussions centred around future strategic options for the FOP Inc. The groups had to create a list, prioritise those lists before giving a presentation and reasoning. After the presentations, it was obvious that we were all 'on the same page'. The Community and Volunteer Support Unit will collate the information and present it at the Friends Forum to be held at Stenhouse Bay, Yorke Peninsula in September this year.

It was valuable to network with other groups, some of whom travel great distances to volunteer in our state's parks. The Friends of Ikara-Flinders Ranges National Park have created a free app to download that includes tours, guides, information and offers. Check out their website. The Walking Trails Support group have also created a free app with information on 16 available walks in the Flinders Ranges.

# Park Report

The number of volunteers on Wednesdays over the past couple of months has been down to only 3 or 4 sometimes due to inclement weather and absences on holidays. However, numbers are back to 7 or 8 over the past couple of weeks.

Work undertaken by the group recently includes:

- Preparation for planting day by clearing areas to be planted and erecting temporary fencing.
- Shed maintenance internal reinforcing and improved tool storage
- Further improving security of the shed and environs by moving Gate 21 further up the entrance track and installing a separate gate to the shed car park and bollards.
- Eradicating artichokes, olives, boxthorns and other feral plants from the area adjacent to the overflow car park.
- Preparation of an area adjacent to the overflow car park in from Gate 1 for planting by Banksia Park Kindy students. See photo below.
