## President's Report

A very happy New Year to all FOAH members and friends! (where did 2018 go?) Someone mentioned to me recently that they were just getting used to writing 2018!

Our meetings will continue to be held at the Tea Tree Gully Museum for 2019. Members are always welcome to attend our meetings. The dates for our next meetings are 3rd April, 5th June, 7th August and 2nd October (AGM).

We thank Gill Starks, President of the Tea Tree Gully National Trust who allows FOAH to meet at this significant local heritage building adjacent to AHRP. This year, Gill and other museum volunteers will be cataloguing the artefacts in the Bakehouse adjacent to Gate 1 entrance to the park. The group will follow Museum Australia guidelines.

Thank you to the Wednesday Working Bee volunteers who kept toiling in the park during the holiday season. As well as working in the park, the volunteers also cleaned and sorted items in the Friends Shed. Recent <u>very</u> hot weather meant they were not able to work in the park for a few weeks. We welcome anyone who is able to assist on a Wednesday morning. We meet at the Friends Shed via Gate 18, Range Road South at 8.15 a.m. if you can help us out, even for an hour, it would be appreciated. On the last Wednesday morning of the month we meet back at the Friends Shed at 11.30 a.m. for morning tea and conversation (usually with our resident possum looking on).

Work undertaken since the November 2018 report included:

Both sides of Newman's Track from Ridgetop Walk.

Removal of Artichoke, African Daisy and Olive.

Water Gully Track from the ruins towards Perseverance Road.

Removal of Artichoke, African Daisy and Olive.

Creek line heading south of Newmans Nursery ruins.

Removal of feral plants including Olive, Hawthorn, African Daisy.

Preparation for Propagation Day

Including sterilising pots.

Collecting boxes of soil, fertilizer etc from Trees for Life

Propagation Day was held on 2nd December 2018 at the Friends Shed and proved very successful with over 20 members and friends attending along with our ranger, Nick. A delicious BBQ and sweets followed the planting of the 9 boxes of seeds provided by our seed collector, Mary Lane.

(**Editor's Note:** Members who are caring for the growing plants are asked to note Mary's advice which is documented on page 12 of this Newsletter.)

Future priorities include:

Clearing feral plants from the creek line heading south from the ruins

Preparing areas identified in preparation for Planting Days in May, June and August.

Refurbishment of the table and seats at the Lookout

Ten staff from Laureate International University in Adelaide joined our Wednesday Working group over 2 weeks in November and December as part of their 'Global Days of Service' obligation. We thank them for their support and look forward to seeing them again later this year.

Due to the recent hot weather encountered, total fire ban days and holiday period, the number of volunteers on Wednesday mornings has been slightly less than normal. However, numbers are expected to increase as the weather cools and the holiday period comes to an end.

Statistics for the Wednesday Working Group from 21 November 2018 – 30 January 2019:

Eight (8) mornings worked

Total of 153.25 hours

Average number of hours per morning is 19.15

Average number of workers per morning is 6.6

In addition:

The 10 Laureate International University staff contributed 25 hours over 2 Wednesdays.

Over 20 members and families contributed 38 hours on Propagation Day.

Volunteers will continue to attend workshops and training sessions including an 'Introduction to Bush Regeneration' workshop that will be conducted by Amy Anderson, our Volunteer Support Officer, and an 'Aboriginal Cultural Awareness Training' session.

It was wonderful to see a number of FOAH members represented at Graham Fisher's funeral on 19 December last year. Graham will always be remembered as a staunch supporter of FOAH and one of its inaugural hard working members.

Our ranger, Nick Purdew reported that motor bike riders have been seen in Anstey Hill Recreation Park (AHRP). Nick has asked that FOAH members and park visitors remain vigilant, and that any reports are forwarded to him ASAP. If possible, forward him the details of time, location, vehicle and rider description. Nick stressed that under no circumstance should people confront anyone suspected of illegal activity and not do anything that would put yourselves in a position of potential danger.

This year will see more students from local schools, including Banksia Park Kindy and Banksia Park International High School Key Club, volunteering in the park. We hope to encourage the students to take 'ownership' of the area they work in, so that they continue to be involved in the preservation and conservation of this wonderful park. Staff from Laureate University in Adelaide also volunteered in the park on 2 occasions in November. We appreciate their assistance and indicated they would like to return to volunteer in the park.

Thank you to our ranger, Nick who assisted us in our applications for two grants endorsed by Friends of Parks Inc which supports the AMLR Natural Resources Management Board's 2018-19 Community NRM Action Grants application for \$5,000 for the project 'Plant a Feast' from FOAH.

The second application from FOAH is for \$10,000 to restore the degraded Water Gully Creek line.

Marketing is an important part of FOAH's future to increase active membership, and to encourage involvement and engagement. One strategy is to look at purchasing banners as a visual reminder of our presence in the park and at functions. Our Facebook page and website have proved very successful in engaging with and informing people of AHRP. There have been some complaints on our Facebook page of people leaving their doggy dropping' bags in the park. Please remember to take the bags with you when leaving the park.

FOAH members Roy and Pat Caldwell have offered several of their 'nature books' to FOAH. When all of our collection has been finally catalogued, we should have quite a wide range of publications in our library.

The Native Orchid Society of SA has released its 2019 calendar. The calendar includes details of the society's events, orchid species information, flowering times and of course beautiful photos. # Propagation Day 2018

A coolish but mercifully dry morning encouraged 25 members and families to our annual propagation day at the Friends Shed. Always difficult to do a head count at FOAH working functions on account of member hyperactivity.

Interestingly the 2017 Propagation Day also attracted 25 members. We are certainly consistent!

In quick time about 250 seeding boxes were filled with soil and fertiliser to receive seed of the following listed plants.

Allocasuarina verticillata	Drooping shea-oak	½ box

Acacia pycnantha	Golden wattle	½ box
Dodonaea viscosa	Sticky hop-bush	1 box
Acacia myrtifolia	Myrtle wattle	½ box
Acacia paradoxa	Prickly wattle	½ box
Acacia acinacea	Wreath wattle	½ box

The boxes and seed were taken by members to be nurtured over the summer months in readiness for our three chosen planting days on Sundays 19 May, 16 June and 18 August.

Mary has subsequently provided advice to growers of the propagated seedlings. See page 12


## Membership Renewal

## Tea Tree Gully Citizenship and Award Ceremony

At the City of Tea Tree Gully Australia Day Citizenship and Award Ceremony on Saturday 26 January 2019 Mayor Kevin Knight announced the winners of Outstanding Citizen and Outstanding Community Group and presented the Awards for 2019.

- The Outstanding Citizen, Christine Houlson, has been the Tea Tree Gully and Northern Zone president and member of the Red Cross Board for three years.
  - As Emergency Service Liaison Officer with Red Cross, Christine was sent to Queensland to assist with an equine flu epidemic and a severe storm.
  - Christine is also the district chairman for Inner Wheel and a member of a choir who raise money for charity.
- The Outstanding Community Group, the Tea Tree Gully Toy Library, is enjoyed by families with children aged under 12, and residents with additional needs, grandparents and carers.

The toy library is an independent not-for-profit organisation run by volunteers that helps to foster children's social development and offers support to isolated and disadvantaged families.

## Advice to Members Growing Seedlings for AHRP.


Mary offers the following suggestions to those who are growing seedlings:

- 1. All seedlings must now be out in FULL sun all day.
- 2. Thin out seedlings to only ONE strong seedling in each tube.
- 3. It is getting too late to transplant seedlings.
- 4. Check for slugs etc in the boxes. A good tip is to take all the tubes out of the white box, checking for slugs on the bottom, then hose out the box. Replace the tubes, grading them from tallest to shortest, so small plants aren't shaded by taller ones.
- 5. If your seedlings are still small (or to push along smaller plants) water with HALF strength liquid fertiliser. (With natives fertilising more is not better.)
- 6. Maintain watering, but be aware that as the weather cools less moisture is ok.
- 7. Any problems feel free to call Mary Lane (0419 671 819).

## Changes in the Park

In the May 2018 issue of Friends of Anstey Hill Newsletter we featured an article which showed how the outlook at the intersection of Torture Hill Track, Ridgetop Walk and Silver Mine Track had changed over the period 1992 – 2018 largely due to revegetation activities during the period. The article was well received by readers and attracted some comment.

When Editor recently found in archival material a photograph that had been taken in March 1983 which showed the devastation caused by the February 16 bushfires of that year he decided to document a similar comparison of 'then and now' photographs.

Making the decision was the easy bit. Putting it into practice was a bit harder. It took a while to realize that many of the identifying landmarks which are visible after a fire has gone through an area are hidden from view when natural regrowth occurs over time. As an added complication people who appear in an earlier photo tend to have moved on to other places when you next look. This doesn't help the task of rediscovering the location and, as the second photo shows, the natural regrowth over the period has been nothing short of spectacular. Considerable track upgrades carried out by National Parks and Wildlife in or about 2009 has also changed the general appearance of the view.

So like most of my 'good ideas at the time' it took a while to come to fruition.


In the event the unique rock configuration at trackside was the prominent identifying factor. Some things remain constant whilst other things are happening!
